Trustees' pages

The trustees took the difficult decision to close our Bournemouth charity shop, which ceased trading at the end of 2018. The shop had served us well for a number of years but posed an increasingly worrying control and compliance problem, being so far away from our centre of operations.

This decision has, of course, resulted in a loss of income to GIN partially offset by a reduction in costs and the trustees' immediate task is to extend our fundraising activities in order to replace this loss



This brings me to the very important subject of legacies. We have been fortunate in the generosity of so many of our supporters in this regard. Many larger charities report that as much as half of their incomes come from this source which has become a major force in charitable giving, given the current pressures on incomes. You will find information on legacy giving on page 7. It is important to bear in mind that this form of giving has substantial tax advantages and these are explained in the leaflet which can be downloaded from our website by following the link on page 7. It is important, however, to emphasise that you should take professional advice on your particular circumstances.

I hope all our readers will take a moment to look at pages 10 and 11 where you will find news about our education programme in Spain. After a slow start this is really taking off thanks to the enthusiastic work of our Spanish colleagues, who like us believe passionately that the only route to lasting change lies in helping rising generations of children to understand that all animals are sensate beings deserving care and kindness and, in particular, that the cruelty meted out to galgos must stop.

I believe that the masses of beautiful drawings done by school children which we receive and their enthusiasm which we have seen on our visits are ample evidence that change can me made. It will take time, but with your help much can be achieved.

Sadly, we have, as I write, received fresh evidence that the most extreme forms of cruelty still persist. We have just heard from our friends at ADANA in Badajoz that a galgo has been found dead hanging from a rope in an abandoned warehouse only 2 km from the city centre. Fortunately, the dog's microchip was in place, enabling the police to trace the owner. He has been charged with cruelty and will, hopefully, be punished and banned from keeping dogs. We are all left saddened and angry at this proof of the continuing barbarity meted out to galgos. However it is encouraging to see the authorities taking action; a rare event. We congratulate our friends in Badajoz and dedicate ourselves anew to bringing such cruelty to an end.

We are continually expanding our work and providing our Spanish colleagues with much needed funding for improvements in infrastructure, veterinary help, transport, coats and blankets for the galgos etc etc. All this alongside the building of education centres and the provision of an array of teaching materials and programmes. None of this would be possible without your help.

Finally, we have been delighted to be able to fund a large tree-planting and a new sensory garden at Galgos del Sol in memory of our founder Anne Finch, who is remembered with such high regard by our Spanish friends. We hope to be able to put in hand similar projects in the other rescue centres we support.

I close with renewed thanks on your behalf to all our wonderful staff, volunteers and trustees for another successful year helping galgos and greyhounds who truly are "in need".



Legacies

We have been very fortunate in recent years to be left legacies in people's Wills as well as receiving kind donations in memory of a loved one.

This income has been invaluable to our charity and has certainly helped us maintain and increase our work for the greyhounds and galgos.



Legacies make a vital contribution to the UK charitable sector and major charities receive half their income from legacies. A legacy is a fine way for supporters to help GIN carry on its work with greyhounds, both in Spain and elsewhere. GIN was founded to help greyhounds and galgos and still devotes its efforts and funds to help these needy dogs.

Making a Will can be complex and it is best to get quotes from solicitors and then talk through your intentions. Then your Will can be drawn exactly as you wish and will achieve what you intend. After making all necessary provision for your dependants, you might decide to leave a legacy to one or more of your favoured charities.

Legacies cost nothing during a lifetime, but remembering GIN by leaving a legacy, will help the charity to continue helping greyhounds and galgos.


If you have included a legacy to GIN in your Will, please let us know. It tells us that we are getting our messages to people who count, and enables GIN to keep you up to date with our progress.

The Galgo situation in Spain

Over the twenty+ years that GIN has been helping the galgos of Spain there have been changes. It is very hard to say accurately how many galgos are abandoned each year, figures quoted vary from \sim 50,000 to \sim 100,000, but what we all know is the figures are in the thousands not hundreds!

When we first offered help to shelters in Spain it was to cover veterinary costs. We discovered that the galgos were not automatically tested for the Mediterranean diseases endemic in Spain - Leishmaniasis, Babesiosis, Heartworm and Ehrlichiosis, nor were they sterilised. This was mostly due to lack of funds and we worked tirelessly, and still do, to raise funds to cover these costs as we could not move or home the dogs without being as sure as we could, that they were healthy and able to cope with the long transports ahead of them

The cruel abandonment of the galgos continues and often when we are asked for help and we see photos of horrific injuries and very traumatised thin dogs, like Roma, it is hard to believe that they will ever recover and be able to be homed. Often when they are rescued and have broken limbs or open wounds they rarely attack their rescuers even though they must be in a lot of pain. They appear to have a lot of strength and seem able to survive so much and yet still have it in their big hearts to trust us humans again.

We do find now that shelters are reporting that more galgos are being handed in by their hunter

owners, some still in a poor way but at least they are safe once they arrive at the shelters.

There are many groups and individuals in Spain, and in the rest of Europe, who help rescue and care for these dogs and find them homes. Galgos make wonderful pets but some have suffered so much during their hunting days that they need homes where people will have the time to help them regain their confidence and learn to trust again.



It is so rewarding when you see your new pet slowly show his/her character and start to relax in their new environment. Over the years we have adopters coming back to us for a second or third galgo. Once you've had a galgo you're hooked!

Galgo adoptions in Spain have increased in some areas which is good to see. They are not really regarded as pets, they are classed as "working dogs" and sadly the animal welfare laws are seldom enforced.

Many shelters do not report cruelty cases they find as so often nothing gets done. One shelter we work with report every abandoned dog they help, rarely do the authorities take action, but each case has to be recorded so there will be a report kept on file which could be used in the future.

As well as carrying out/supporting the rescue and rehoming work, which we appreciate is at best first aid; we have tried to tackle the galgo problem at source. Our hopes are that our education programme will support the teaching of English in Spanish schools, educate the children about the plight of the galgos and change the perception people have of these dogs. The aim is to develop empathy for dogs and help make a difference to the many that are in need of loving homes, hopefully encouraging more Spanish people to adopt a galgo as a family pet.

Please continue to support our work, without the tremendous support you give to us we would not be able to do this work, a very big **THANK YOU** to everyone.



Education

The education programme continues to go well in Spain. Tina and Sam at Galgos del Sol in Murcia have been very busy promoting this and have managed to reach around 400 children a month. The competitions are popular with entrants from a number of schools in Spain. You can see the February winners here -





Sam at Galgos del Sol said "We have done the Origami Galgo and it was a total success the kids loved it!!! We have plans for a workshop on a Saturday morning to do the snuffle mat"

We have lots of activities on our site, in English and Spanish, and are pleased to see that these are being downloaded both here and abroad. We hope

this is the beginning of a much wider appreciation of the galgo welfare problem. Please take a look and perhaps your children, grandchildren might like to make a knitted coat or blanket for a galgo or have some fun making them a snuffle mat.

Jisseth continues to visit schools and organise visits to the Arca de Noe shelter in Albacete. In 2018 they reached ~2,800 children. Mada at RECAL is also working hard on the education project arranging for the children to come and meet the dogs. She has

been pleased that schools are asking her about arranging visits now. More shelters are using the material and the feedback we are receiving continues to be positive.

We keep adding new material to the site, which can be downloaded, and have some new merchandise items to support this programme, including galgo Pietro (photo right), featured in the education material. Our Work in Spain

In 2018 we were able to help ~600 greyhounds and galgos by funding necessary veterinary and/or transport costs. We would not be able to achieve this without the wonderful support we receive from you, our supporters, and the amazing collaborations we have with many shelters in Spain and adoption groups in mainland Europe.

Finding homes for the rescued dogs is the final part of the journey for the galgos and greyhounds, they have been through so much during their years as racers or hunters and want nothing more than regular meals, a comfortable bed (a nice sofa will do!) and some nice walks, not too long, especially if it is raining.

As mentioned before in our newsletters, as well as continuing to aid and support the rescue and rehoming of the galgos we have also given funding for projects at several shelters in Spain to assist their work. The majority of shelters helping the galgos are run by volunteers with no major funding and important, often much needed improvements/repairs, are not high on the list due to lack of funds.

We recently gave approval for funding the repairs to some kennels

and shaded areas at RECAL in Almendralejo. Mada and her team do a great job looking after so many dogs and the majority of the galgos we bring to the UK come from this area of Spain. We also support galgos that Mada rehomes in France, Spain, Germany and Holland

After visiting RECAL a few years ago we funded,

along with a German charity, the building of the exercise paddocks. These have definitely enhanced life for the dogs as they can be taken out individually or in groups and exercised daily and socialised much easier than before. They are also used when the school children visit to take part in the education programme and get to meet the galgos.

Last month Claudette of the APAPA shelter in Ayamonte was asked to take in nine galgos from Caceres. We have worked with Claudette for some time and provide funding for the veterinary costs for the galgos her shelter can help. This time we put her in touch with Eva and Jorge who help ADANA in Badajoz, and now have their own vehicle for transporting the dogs. The trip went well and the dogs arrived safely at Ayamonte and received a lovely welcome.





We recently sent two boxes to APAPA and Claudette wrote to us when they arrivedMonday was a very busy day and we had a great time uploading this post to Facebook to thank our friends of GIN. Last week we received these two very large boxes filled with all kinds of donations; collars, leads, bowls, toys, treats, coats, blankets for the dogs and water bottles, stickers - little things for educational days. Many of these items we were able to use when our new greyhounds arrived. Thank you very much Carolyn and all your team of Greyhounds in Need for remembering our animals and collaborating in their welfare.............



Arca de Noe in Albacete continue to help many galgos, around 150 last year. The majority go to Italy for homing but many travel to France and Slovenia. We are pleased that Nina of SASIN, in Slovenia, will be able to take more galgos this year and we have offered help with transport costs. It is wonderful to see how the interest in the galgos has grown in a short time and Nina sends us lovely photos of them settled in their new homes.



Sole and Amparro visited us at the end of last year to discuss their work at the shelter and to give us an update on projects we have funded as well as discussing their future plans/projects.

Running a shelter of this size, with so many animals being cared for at any one time, takes a lot of organising and funding.

Also there are always maintenance jobs needing to be done, one of their biggest

jobs is filling in the many holes the dogs, especially the galgos, like to dig. They are more like craters and they like nothing more than to dig a nice hole, drag their blanket into it and then sunbathe!

We discussed the education project with them and were pleased that Sam, from **edProjects**, who has helped us with the education work from the beginning, was able to join us. The children are enjoying using the new



Margaret, Carmen and their team at APA Santa Clara are settling well at their new shelter.

Margaret wrote to us "On the day the shelter opened we were alerted to a brindle galgo running in the countryside, looking for food and very thin. We were able to catch him and he was the first into the new shelter. What a happy chappy to see all these people coming through our gates on the opening evening. His name is Captain and he is young, under 2 years old. He soon put weight on and then he shared the GIN run with 3 galgas (they left for homes last month). He has missed the girls but the good news is he also has a good home to go to next month. This week he was castrated so getting him ready to travel. See photos taken today. He has his cone on and is giving me kisses '



They are receiving a number of galgos now, some poor cases and we are able to offer some funding towards the veterinary costs, as we did for Captain, and Margaret is able to find homes for most of them in France.

We have also been able to fund a security system for the shelter which is now up and running.

Tina and Galgos del Sol continue their good work in Murcia. They are rescuing a lot of galgos and can have ~160 in their care at any one time.



We visited Tina when she first started helping the galgos keeping them at her home and other fincas. We visited the site for the new shelter and it looked huge and barren. We were able to look at the plans for the new centre and realised what a mammoth job it would be to get it off the ground so it is wonderful now to see how much has been achieved to create a safe environment for the galgos to come and be cared for until they are homed.

As with many shelters in Spain, Galgos del Sol receive some very sad cases that need to spend a lot of time with them before being able to be put up for adoption. Many galgos amaze us at how well they settle into homes, seeming to take everything in their stride and trusting us humans from day one. Sadly this is not the case for all galgos and some are so traumatised that they need time to gradually understand they are safe.

Many everyday things that we use and take for granted can be very frightening for dogs that have never been in a home. I had one galgo who hated the hoover and would hide and shake whenever it came into the room and another galgo who wouldn't move off his bed , quite happy to have his paws lifted up so the hoover could move around him.

Galgos can suffer "laminate panic" as they can't grip on the flooring and can slide everywhere so in the early days it is easier to place rugs around for them to walk along. Even outside they can freeze on certain surfaces, like gravel, as it can hurt their paws. At Galgos del Sol they have a small sensory area for the dogs to help them get used to different surfaces.



Following the death of our Founder, Anne Finch, last year, we received some donations in her memory. As mentioned in our last newsletter we funded the planting of 100 trees at Galgos del Sol and have offered funding to expand the sensory garden there.

We feel this project will help Tina and her team rehabilitate the galgos, giving them a quiet, calm area away from the main kennels to socialise and gain confidence with new surroundings and people.

Anne cared so much for the galgos and we feel would be pleased that even the most traumatised ones will have a chance of a future. Her three legged galgo, Mario, came from Galgos del Sol.

Tina and Sam continue to work hard on the education project.

The activities are popular and the entrants to the drawing competitions are growing.

The galgo wristbands and the #teamgalgo water bottles are popular with the children and help to spread the word.



Last year we were able to fund the initial veterinary costs for sixty galgos for Galgos en Familia in Malaga as well as helping with some veterinary costs for puppies they had taken in. We have worked with Vera and her team for many years now and are pleased to hear that the numbers of dogs they can help continues to increase, they even helped with some non-galgos last year too. They have moved to a new larger shelter since our last visit and we are planning to go and visit them soon.

112carlottagalgos, also in Malaga, and run by Charlotte, moved to a larger finca since our last visit so we hope to be able to visit them at the same time. We have supported Charlotte's work almost from the beginning and last year were able to fund the initial veterinary costs for forty-three galgos.

Our visits allow us to see for ourselves how projects we have funded are working and also allows us to see if there are new projects we can consider which will be of benefit to the galgos. We will include a report of our visit to Malaga in the next newsletter.

We are fortunate to have worked with the groups mentioned here for some time and have been pleased and proud to see them grow and be able to reach out and help so many galgos in need. The main help we can give is for veterinary costs and these rise each year but we know how important it is for the dogs to receive the veterinary care they need and be checked for the Mediterranean diseases.

We also fund a lot of transport costs and these have increased over the years too but it is very important that the dogs are transported safely and in purpose built vehicles.

We help other shelters in Spain by sending many coats, blankets and treats and some are using the education material too.

As mentioned earlier in this newsletter we have been fortunate to receive some legacies which have enabled us to improve infrastructure at some of the above shelters as well as promoting the education project.

The majority of our funds are raised in the UK and much is spent in France, Italy and Spain. A full audit trail is needed for all monies spent by GIN in the UK and abroad.

We have worked with GACI (Greyhound Adopt Centre Italy) since the last greyhound racing track, in Rome, closed in 2002

Elisa, Chiara, Lily and their team wanted to continue helping ex-racing greyhounds find homes and also wanted to help the galgos from Spain.

Each year they find homes for

~130 greyhounds from Ireland and ~100 galgos from Spain.

We are able to help with funding for veterinary and transport costs for the galgos and transport costs for the greyhounds.

FRANCE



In 2000, Catherine Madry telephoned GIN asking if she could help in any way with the greyhounds and galgos. She set up her own charity, Levriers en Detresse, and her work for these needy dogs began.

Catherine has been able to take many galgos over the years and has encouraged other groups in France to help. She also helps ex-racing greyhounds from England and we receive some lovely photos of them enjoying their new lives.

Catherine has also kindly transported the galgos we bring to the UK for homing and visited us last year to discuss our work and the situation regarding the greyhounds in Macau as the track was closing down.

There has been a lot of publicity about the Canidrome in Macau and what would happen to the greyhounds that were kept and raced there. Many individuals and groups got involved and many petitions were set up as well as appeals for help for these dogs.

The main groups involved in this rescue were ANIMA in Macau, Pet Levrieri, and Grey2kUSA. Catherine visited Macau twice to find out more about the situation and in February this year was able to receive fourteen ex-racing greyhounds, three are featured here.

We were able to offer funding to Levriers en Detresse towards their costs helping these dogs who will all be homed in France.

Catherine reports that the dogs have settled well at the Lévriers Garden and once ready they will be going to new homes.



They think he most likely had a blood clot that travelled or a stroke.

Our vet said that it was probably kinder for him to slip away at home rather than being hospitalised and examined prodded and poked it was inevitable and nothing could have been done. Vet's Corner

What Makes Greyhounds Unique? - A Vet Perspective

Greyhounds are one of a kind. Their sweetnature, adaptability and laid-back attitude makes them suitable for all kinds of families and situations. Not only are they unique dogs in terms of temperament, they also come with a number of anatomical and physiological differences.



Red blood cells

Greyhounds are built for relatively short bursts of speed. To facilitate the huge oxygen demand of body tissues during a race, a greyhound's blood has adapted so that it has a higher concentration of red blood cells with a higher concentration of haemoglobin in. This way, a smaller volume of blood is able to deliver a larger volume of oxygen to the muscles.

Body fat

Much of the greyhound's sleek appearance is owed to its general lack of bodyfat. A greyhound's body fat percentage is around 17% compared to approximately 35% in other dog breeds. This lack of insulation means that it is important for owners to provide their greyhound with a warm, soft bed and a coat for winter walks. Great care is also taken by vets/nurses when greyhounds are under anaesthetic with the use of heat pads, blankets, bubble-wrap and many more!

Delayed bleeding

Research shows that a proportion of greyhounds have a higher tendency to suffer from bleeding or bruising after trauma or surgery. The bleeding often occurs around 36 to 48 hours after the procedure or trauma incident. The problem is known as "fibrinolytic syndrome" which results in a weaker clot strength. Due to this tendency for clots to break down, some vets recommend treatment of greyhounds with an antifibrinolytic agent, known as tranexamic acid, after a surgical procedure.

Corns

Greyhounds often develop corns on their foot pads. Corns are painful lesions made up of excess keratin, similar to those seen on human feet. Greyhounds with corns are generally lame on the affected foot and are especially reluctant to walk on hard surfaces.



A small round lesion may be visible on the pad which is painful when pressure is applied.

The exact cause of corns in greyhounds is unknown but it is thought scar tissue, warts and/or injuries can contribute to their formation. Corns can be treated in a number of ways from providing boots to surgical excision.
